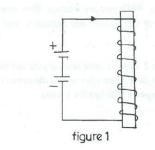
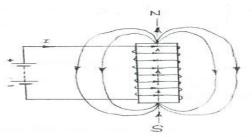
1. Figure 1 is a coil of wire wound on an iron core connected to a battery.



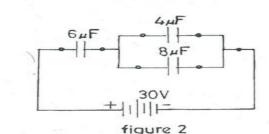
- (a) Sketch the magnetic field pattern of the current-carrying coil indicating its polarity.

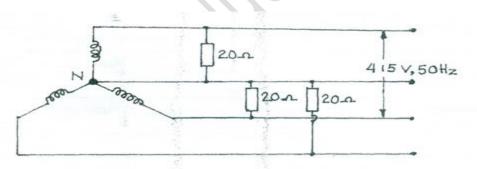

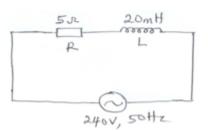

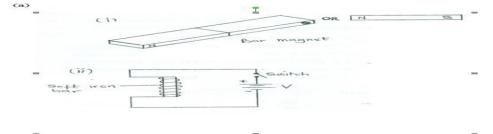

- (3) Cross-Section of earth wire: The size of the earth wire should be 10mm<sup>2</sup> or 16mm<sup>2</sup>
